	Ina Linge: From Queer Livability to Queer Natures: Sexual Knowledge Production beyond the Human Room: SH680 1041			
	Moderator: Simone Pfleger (University of Alberta)			
	In her keynote lecture, Ina Linge will address the entanglement of queer and non-human life in the archive of German sexual knowledge production. Her recent monograph, Queer Livability: German Sexual Sciences and Life Writing (2023), proposes a series of new methods for looking at life writin by queer, trans and non-binary people that emerged out of early-twentieth-century sexual knowledge production in the German-speaking world. The keynote address explores how some of these new methods and lenses can also help us to explore non-human traces in the archive of German sexual knowledge production. Engaging with the fields of queer German studies, queer ecology and animal studies, the keynote will investigate cultural, literary, visual and scientific sources to explore how non-human animal bodies, behaviour and metaphors are used to develop and challenge modern ideas about the nature of sex, gender and sexuality.			
	<b>Ina Linge</b> is Senior Lecturer at the University of Exeter. Her research focuses on queer German studies, environmental humanities, and medical humanities and investigates early-twentieth-century sexual knowledge production as a collaborative endeavor between the arts and medical and natural sciences. Her publications include her open access <u>monograph</u> on which her keynote is based, a co-edited volume on "Sex and Nature" for <i>Environmental Humanities</i> and numerous articles and book chapters.

13:00-15:00	WCGS Book Prize Lecture Parallel Public: Experimental Art in Late East Germany Room: SH680 1041 Moderator: James Skidmore (University of Waterloo) Sara Blaylock will discuss her book Parallel Public: Experimental Art in Late East Germany (MIT University Press, 2022), which explores the work of artists who used body-based practices—including performance, film, and photography—to create new vocabularies of representation, sharing their projects through independent networks of dissemination and display. From the collective films and fashion shows of Erfurt's Women Artists Group, which fused art with feminist political action, to Gino Hahnemann, the queer filmmaker and poet who set nudes alight in city parks, these creators were as bold in their ventures as they were indifferent to state power. Sara Blaylock is Assistant Professor of Art History at the University of Minnesota Duluth.
